# From the Vicarage

#### Dear Friends

I have become a virtual grandad! Last week my daughter gave birth to Baby Jack, who arrived suddenly, eight weeks early and is set to spend the next few weeks in Colchester Hospital. I say a virtual grandad, because so far, I've only seen him on my phone, alternatively filling the screen in a close up shot and then a tiny three pounds doll in his parents' arms. Sadly, I am far more interested in him than he is in me! Hopefully that will change as the months pass and I see him in person, and in due course get to hold him for myself.

I am reminded of the creation story from Genesis 2, when Adam is introduced to the creatures of the earth, culminating in Eve, formed, we are told, from Adam's rib, and he exclaims "This at last is bone of my bones and flesh of my flesh". This week in school worship I've been telling the story of Abraham, whom God called to leave Haran and go to the land of Canaan. It is a time of year when children are facing change, whether a new class or a new school. Abraham trusted God and we must do the same. Though old and childless, Abraham is promised that his descendants will be more than the stars in the sky, or the grains of sand on the shore, and the birth of Isaac marks a sign that God's promise will be fulfilled. Indeed, every birth is in some sense the fulfilment of God's promise, and Baby Jack is no exception.

Events such as this give life a welcome new perspective. They force us to think again about what is of true and lasting significance. It is easy to lose perspective in church life, to fail to see the wood for

the trees. Perhaps the danger is even more acute amongst the clergy, who find themselves stressing about the state of the church building, or the deficit in the accounts. Such matters are important of course. In the coming months we will be launching the Parish Giving Scheme at St Chad's, to address the failure of our contributions to keep place with inflation, and the need to be realistic about our giving in relation to our income. However, the Christian faith does not begin with such questions, it begins with a baby, whose mother was Mary, and whose grandmother was St Anne, after whom Singleton Church is named.

This baby comes as an expression of God's love and with the assurance that God is with us. Baby Jack too is an expression of God's love and a focus for the love of so many around him. Another Jack, Bishop Jack, former Bishop of Lancaster, used to say that if we loved our church like we love our grandchildren, then all our financial problems would be solved. I'm sure he was right.

I heard of someone recently who left a local church because they thought there was too much talk of money, but there can never be too much talk of love. At its best a financial gift is an expression of love, and we must all wrestle with what generosity looks like in love and in money. Love also involves sacrifice and the Child of Bethlehem went on to die on the Cross, as the supreme expression of his love for us. We would sacrifice much for our grandchildren, and those who walk with Baby Jack may need to share the challenges he will face as a premature baby, but for now we rejoice in the blessing of a gift from God!

As your Vicar I urge you to consider the Parish Giving Scheme and to note the events of our Open Week in September, as set out in the Vicar's Notes.

As a grandparent I urge you to embrace the life affirming moments that put life in perspective and remind us once more that what truly matters is love- our love for others, their love for us and God's love for us all!

# Women in the Old Testament

In Year 5 this half-term, our RE unit has been exploring the lives of significant women in the Old Testament. One of the women that we have learnt about in depth is Jochebed. # Christian Aid



At EMU, on Tuesday 10th June, Jean Cooke and Jennie Sly gave a wonderful presentation of poetry and flower arrangements to 12 of us. On Tuesday 8th July, we had a 'Jacob's Join' of snacks at my home when 8 members came and we welcomed Archdeacon Anne to our get-together. Our next EMU is our planning meeting on Tuesday 9th September. Before that, we have the Deanery Festival on Wednesday 3rd September at 2pm at Christ Church Thornton when 4 of our members will receive long service certificates.

We continue to collect items for the Women's Refuges. They need any size of nappies, shampoos, conditioners and any cleaning items. They do accept some small kitchen electricals - they get them PAT tested before giving them out and also accept plates, bowls etc and pyjamas.

The books we collected for the Refuges were sorted out with others from the Archdeaconry and sent out.

# An update from the bellringers

Two of our young ringers turned 18 in April & May. Another of our young ringers moved to Greece in early June. We were very sorry to see her go but we wish her all the very best.

We are delighted that Morgan, who started to learn bellringing in October 2021, arranged and rang a Quarter Peal to celebrate his 18th birthday. On Tues 27th May, the band rang 1250 Cambridge Surprise Minor in 42 mins at at Chad, Poulton. It was Morgan's first quarter of Cambridge Surprise minor and believed to be the first quarter peal of Cambridge rung at St Chad's in 70 years.

A few weeks later, Morgan rang his first Peal: 5040 minor - Extents 1,3 of Kent Treble Bob minor. Extents 4,5 of Cambridge Surprise Minor and Extents 2,6,7 of Plain Bob minor. This was his first attempt, and was rung at Goosnargh on Tuesday 10th June 2025 in 2hrs 36 minutes. We are all in awe of Morgan and the progress he has made. Well done!

# St. Anne's Saint Day - 26th July

One thing is certain – Mary the mother of Jesus must have had parents. Beyond that, nothing is certain – but church tradition offers some details.

The first mention of Anne and Joachim as being Mary's parents was found in the apocryphal Gospel of James (second century) which has no historical validity. James says that after years of childlessness, Joachim was praying in the desert one day when an angel appeared to Anne to tell her that she would conceive. Anne then promised to dedicate the child to God, as Hannah had done with Samuel. Certainly Anne, mother of Mary, has been honoured from as early as the sixth century, when a church was built in her honour in Constantinople. Other relics and pictures of her found in Rome date from the 8<sup>th</sup> century.

The sad truth is that, as the Bible is silent on the subject, we will never really know about Mary's parents. But one thing we can assume, because it is based on the character of Mary herself. Her gentle humility and graciousness and informed knowledge about her faith point to a childhood spent among devout believers in God.
